This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is made and entered into by and between the Absentee Shawnee Tribe REACH US and Absentee Shawnee Tribe SDPI Fitness Director. The programs are to establish partnerships within the Department of Community Health and Prevention to establish a partnership to implement health promotion disease prevention activities in the Southern Plains of Oklahoma.

PURPOSE


To promote coordination of physical activities, nutritional activities, promote breast feeding, and decreasing tobacco usage activities which increase staff capacities to mutually benefit both parties and the Absentee Shawnee Tribe. The parties will work together to provide activities to meet and exceed the goals of REACH US and SDPI, benefiting citizens of the Absentee Shawnee Tribe, citizens of other Federally recognized American Indian Nations, and community members within the service area of the Absentee Shawnee Tribe.

GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

REACH US will provide registration fees, per diem and lodging for SDPI staff with the understanding the knowledge and skills gained from training sessions will be utilized to meet the goals of the Absentee Shawnee Tribe REACH US program.



**Memorandum of Agreement
between
The Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country
and
Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation**

1. Concept

Funded by the Indian Health Service (HIS), the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) will implement a diabetes prevention program in 35 local Native American Boys & Girls Clubs. These Clubs have received grants to be used for direct operating expenses associated with this initiative.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country has provided a safe environment for the youth of the Cherokee Nation since 1997 including prevention programming aimed at fostering healthy lifestyles and deterring risky behaviors. The Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation has provided health prevention and treatment services to the members of the Cherokee Tribe since 2003. Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country and Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation agree to the following collaboration designed to best deliver the diabetes prevention program to tribal members served by both entities.

II. Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country will:

1. Coordinate collaborative program implementation and scheduling with Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation.
2. Organize recruitment of program participants, staff and volunteers.
3. Provide financial management of the grant, including purchasing program materials as needed.
4. Insure maintenance of a safe and sanitary program space.
5. Maintain regular communication with Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation primary contact.

III. Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation will:

1. Identify select staff to serve as Primary contacts for diabetes prevention program efforts, and serve as a liaison to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country
2. Provide medical expertise, information, resources and guidance through accessible Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation staff when possible, as requested by the Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country Program Coordinator.
3. Assist Boys & Girls Clubs of Green Country staff in identifying possible program participants through referrals of youth at-risk for diabetes.
4. Schedule, in conjunction with the Boys & Girls Clubs Green Country Program Coordinator, a time to administer health screening of program participants, if desired.

5. Interact with Club Staff and members through participation in diabetes prevention program sessions, community service activities, or other Club program areas, as available.

IV. Term of Agreement

This AGREEMENT shall take effect upon receipt of signatures of the parties and will continue in force until it is amended or terminated in writing and signed by all parties.

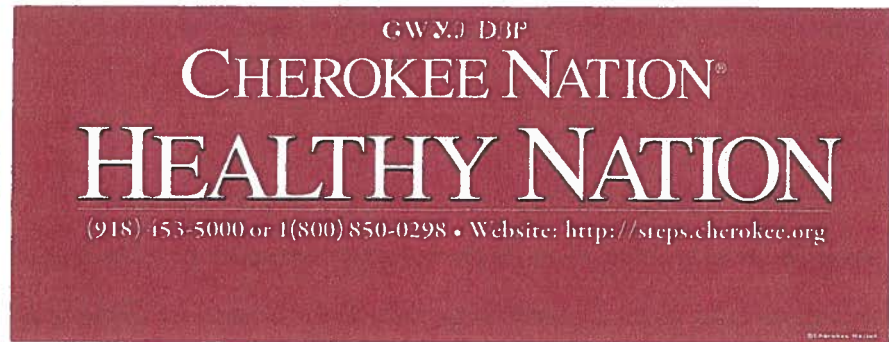

Memorandum of Understanding

This memorandum of Understanding (MOU) establishes a partnership between Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation and Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Services.

I. PURPOSE AND SCOPE

Cherokee Nation Healthy Nation and Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Services are forming a collaboration to promote healthy communities by combining and sharing resources.

Each organization of this MOU is responsible for its own expenses related to this MOU. There will not be an exchange of funds between the parties for tasks associated with this MOU.

II. RESPONSIBILITIES

The organizations agree to the following tasks for this MOU:

Healthy Nation will:

- Provide a conducive meeting environment.
- Provide any program information necessary.
- Provide direction in attaining mutual program goals.
- Provide training on Healthy Nation programs.
- Provide technical assistance.

- Become partners with the Healthy Nation in meeting program goals and objectives.
- Work with Healthy Nation to include input and comments on program curriculum and activities.
- Provide training to staff when available.
- Attend scheduled meetings.




Addams Elementary enters into this *Memorandum of Understanding* with Indian Health Care Resource Center (IHCRC) of Tulsa, in support of IHCRC's REACH grant. IHCRC is an Oklahoma, Indian-controlled nonprofit corporation, which provides comprehensive health services to the population of American Indians living in metropolitan Tulsa. We understand that IHCRC developed its work plan in close consultation and involvement of the Tulsa Indian community to support the healthy growth and development of Tulsa area Indian children and youth. Our school will collaborate with IHCRC to support and advance the project goal of sustaining culturally appropriate community level interventions which provide physical activity, nutrition education, and commercial tobacco prevention by Tulsa area American Indian children and youth, and support the goal of improving health policy in schools and other agencies in the Tulsa area.

In support of the successful operation of the REACH grant program, Addams Elementary School agrees to:

1. Allow IHCRC to provide a special health education class one day each week for the school year, engaging students in health education activities, including CATCH (Coordinated Approach to Child Health) curriculum.
2. Allow IHCRC to use the school facilities for up to four weeks of summer camp.
3. Allow IHCRC to use the school facilities for an after school program, Monday – Friday from 2:45 – 5:30 p.m.
4. Work with IHCRC staff to train Addams staff in CATCH activities.
5. Participate in the school health inventory.
6. Allow IHCRC staff to participate in Healthy & Fit School Advisory Committee.

The term of this agreement shall be September 30, 2008 to September 29, 2010. Responsibility for and coordination of this Memorandum of Understanding shall rest with the respective directors of the organizations (or departments).

PARTIES

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is made and entered into by and between the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes R.E.A.C.H. U.S. and the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes R.E.Sp.E.C.T. Programs to establish a partnership to implement health promotion disease prevention activities in the Southern Plains of Oklahoma.

PURPOSE

To promote coordination of physical activities to the mutual benefit of both parties and the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes. The parties will work together to provide physical activities for the benefit of Native Americans in the service area under the jurisdiction of the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes.

GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

R.E.A.C.H. U.S. will provide registration fees, per diem and travel for Kimit Chalepah to attend two training sessions with the understanding that Kimit will use the knowledge and skill gained at the two training sessions to implement physical activity interventions to tribal people residing in the jurisdictional locations of the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes. Training will consist of experiential education at "The Experience" Work-shop to be held on August 27-29 and a Work-shop on August 13th – 14th on the CATCH school program implementation and an Active Learning games day sponsored by the Indian Health Care Resource Center. Both of the training sites will be in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Each of the parties agree to collaborate to develop, implement, maintain and monitor physical fitness activities on experiential education. They agree to participate in promoting the CATCH curriculum in school settings and to participate in Active Learning games at tribally sponsored events.

This Memorandum of Understanding is effective on August 13, 2009 and will remain effective until September 29, 2010. In the event that a Party no longer desires to be a part of this MOU, the party may terminate this MOU with written notification, 30 days prior to termination.

Together, the Parties enter into this MOU to Reduce Disparities in Diabetes and Cardiovascular Disease among American Indians through Increasing Physical Activity, Nutrition and Tobacco Abuse Prevention.

1. Service Provider, Mr. Wattenbarger, agrees to present information regarding the 24/7 Tobacco Policy process to Contractors, Legacy Projects and OSDH REACH US personnel during one monthly Southern Plains REACH US Steering Committee Meeting held in Oklahoma City and/or Tulsa within one year of the signed Understanding and/or supply Technical Assistance, as requested regarding Tobacco Use Prevention Services.
2. Each Party and/or organization of this MOU is responsible for its own expenses related to this Understanding. There will not be an exchange of funds between the Parties for services and/or tasks associated with this MOU.
3. This Memorandum of Understanding will terminate on September 29, 2010.
