FY 2016 Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Grant

The purpose of the **R**esidential **S**ubstance **A**buse **T**reatment (RSAT) Grant is to assist states and units of local government in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs within state and local correctional and detention facilities in which prisoners are incarcerated for a period of time sufficient to permit substance abuse treatment.

In order to receive programmatic funding, state correctional and detention treatment programs must ensure that programs:

- I. Last between six and twelve months;
- 2. Be provided in residential treatment facilities where participating prisoners are set apart from the general correctional population;
- 3. Focus on substance abuse problems of the inmate;
- 4. Develop the inmate's cognitive, behavioral, social, vocational, and other skills; and,
- 5. Continue to conduct urinalysis and/or other proven reliable forms of drug and alcohol testing for those enrolled in the residential substance abuse treatment programs and post programs while they remain in the custody of the state.

In order to receive programmatic funding, aftercare services must:

- I. Involve coordination between the correctional treatment program and other social service and rehabilitation programs, such as education and job training, parole supervision, halfway houses, self-help, and peer group programs.
- 2. To qualify as an aftercare program, the head of the substance abuse treatment program must work in conjunction with state and local authorities and organizations involved in substance abuse treatment to assist in the placement of program participants into community substance abuse treatment facilities upon release.
- 3. In addition, these activities and services must be coordinated with the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services that address the needs of this target population.
- 4. No more than 10 percent of the award may be used for treatment of those released from a state facility not to exceed more than one (1) year.

The Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs (OJA) was awarded \$37,898 to fund the Juvenile Relapse Avoidance Project (J-RAP) which would serve juveniles throughout the state exiting Level E and Secure Facilities who are at high and moderate risk of relapse upon their return to the community. The goals are to decrease recidivism due to the resumption of substance use and to improve positive outcomes, such as completion of education and obtainment of employment for these high risk youth.

The Oklahoma Department of Corrections (DOC) was awarded \$152,113 to implement the RSAT Grant Program in six (6) facilities across the state. It is anticipated that the DOC will serve approximately 700 inmates in FY2016.

The Eddie Warrior Correctional Center is an 82-bed regimented treatment program for female offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a therapeutic community model and a cognitive behavioral treatment approach.

Mack Alford Correctional Center

The Mack Alford Correction Center is a 36-bed facility for male offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a cognitive behavioral treatment approach. The separate facility includes offenders and graduates that participate in relapse prevention while remaining in the unit.

The Bill Johnson Correctional Center is a 220-bed regimented treatment program for male offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a therapeutic community model and a cognitive behavioral treatment approach.

William S. Key Correctional Center

The William S. Key Correctional Center is a 164-bed residential substance abuse treatment program for male offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a cognitive behavioral treatment approach.

Lawton Community Corrections Center

Lawton, Oklahoma

The Lawton Community Corrections Center is a 20-bed residential substance abuse treatment program for male offenders who are at the community security level. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a cognitive behavioral treatment approach. Relapse prevention and reintegration are key components.

Mabel Bassett Correctional Facility

The Mabel Bassett Correctional Facility is a 44-bed residential substance abuse treatment program for female offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using cognitive behavioral treatment approach in the minimum security unit.
