The Oklahoma District Attorneys Council is pleased to present the *Advanced Coordinated Community Response Team Training: Investigation Strategies to Promote Evidence Based Prosecutions and Support Forfeiture By Wrongdoing* to be held November 29 2012, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Sarkeys Foundation, 530 East Main, Norman, Oklahoma.

This one-day training is designed for personnel in law enforcement, domestic violence services, prosecution, and other agencies involved in improving the criminal justice system's response to domestic violence.

TRAINING OBJECTIVES

- ◆ Learn the importance of evidence based investigations and prosecutions
- ◆ Learn the importance of building effective cases through the CCR team, especially in misdemeanor assaults, regardless of victim participation
- ◆ Identify the types of evidence that can be obtained in the investigation to assist with charging strategies
- ◆ Identify the types of evidence to gather and questions to ask to build witness intimidation and/or forfeiture by wrongdoing cases

ABOUT THE SPEAKERS

Rhonda Martinson is an Attorney Advisor for AEquitas: The Prosecutors' Resource on Violence Against Women. As an Attorney Advisor, she presents on trial strategy, legal analysis and policy, and ethical issues related to violence against women at the local, state, and national level. She conducts research; develops training materials, resources, and publications; and provides case consultation and technical assistance for prosecutors and allied professionals.

Prior to joining AEquitas she served initially as a staff attorney and eventually as one of the managing attorneys at the Battered Women's Justice Project, a national resource center on the criminal justice response to domestic violence. BWJP is a program of Domestic Abuse Intervention Programs in Duluth, Minnesota, home of the Duluth model of coordinated community response. During her 14 years at BWJP, she provided national training and technical assistance on coordinating community responses to violence against women, the role of prosecutors and allied professionals in a coordinated community response, and evaluating prosecutorial and other criminal justice responses to violence against women.

Lieutenant Mark Wynn was a 20-year member of the Nashville Police Department where he served as Lieutenant to the Domestic Violence Division and a member of the Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team for 15 years. He has been the recipient of 121 commendations and 51 awards and certificates including the 1998 Nashvillian of the Year Award and the National Improvement of Justice Award. Lt. Wynn was selected in 1995 as one of the top ten police officers in the United States by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and Parade Magazine. He is a 1994 Graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation National Academy - Session 178.
