**FY 2006 Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Grant**

The purpose of the **R**esidential **S**ubstance **A**buse **T**reatment (RSAT) Grant is to assist states and units of local government in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs within state and local correctional and detention facilities in which prisoners are incarcerated for a period of time sufficient to permit substance abuse treatment.

In order to receive programmatic funding, state correctional and detention treatment programs must ensure that programs:

1. Last between six and twelve months;
2. Be provided in residential treatment facilities where participating prisoners are set apart from the general correctional population;
3. Focus on substance abuse problems of the inmate;
4. Develop the inmate's cognitive, behavioral, social, vocational, and other skills; and,
5. Continue to conduct urinalysis and/or other proven reliable forms of drug and alcohol testing for those enrolled in the residential substance-abuse treatment programs and post programs while they remain in the custody of the state.

The Oklahoma Department of Corrections (DOC) was awarded \$155,222 in FY2006 federal grant funds to implement the RSAT Grant Program in seven (7) facilities across the state. Due to a significant reduction in funding, it is anticipated that the DOC will serve approximately 495 offender in FY2006.

- This award is a **72% reduction in funds** from FY2005.
- According to DOC, over 50% of incarcerated offenders exhibit a need for substance abuse treatment.
- In FY2005, substance abuse treatment was provided to 1,979 offenders.
- Preliminary data across a 30-month time span suggests that offenders completing the cognitive-behavioral based substance abuse treatment have a survival rate higher than those that receive no treatment while incarcerated.
- RSAT graduates had a recidivism rate of 17.36% while the general population offenders, with an identified substance abuse treatment need that did not receive treatment, had a 54.97% recidivism rate.

#### **Eddie Warrior Correctional Center**

#### **Taft, Oklahoma**

The Eddie Warrior Correctional Center is an 82-bed regimented treatment program for female offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a therapeutic community model and a cognitive behavioral treatment approach.

#### **Mack Alford Correctional Center**

#### **Stringtown, Oklahoma**

The Mack Alford Correction Center is a 48-bed facility for male offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a cognitive behavioral treatment approach. The separate facility includes offenders and graduates that participate in relapse prevention while remaining in the unit.

#### **Bill Johnson Correctional Center**

#### **Altus, Oklahoma**

Bill Johnson Correctional Center is a 428-bed regimented treatment program for male offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a therapeutic community model and a cognitive behavioral treatment approach.

#### **William S. Key Correctional Center**

#### **Fort Supply, Oklahoma**

The William S. Key Correctional Center is a 135-bed residential substance abuse treatment program for male offenders. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a cognitive behavioral treatment approach.

#### **Elk City Community Work Center**

#### **Elk City, Oklahoma**

The Elk City Community Work Center is the site for two programs for male offenders. The programs are designed to complement one another in regard to content and scheduling. The basic program provides substance abuse treatment for offenders who have a history of substance abuse using a cognitive behavioral approach. The secondary program is offered to graduates of other substance abuse treatment programs from higher security levels. Relapse prevention and reentry are key components of the program. The entire 90-bed male facility is a therapeutic community model for both programs. The community level model substitutes vocational training emphasis for the physical fitness elements in higher security therapeutic communities.

**Lawton Community Corrections Center**

The Lawton Community Corrections Center is a 20-bed residential substance abuse treatment program for male offenders who are at the community security level. The program provides substance abuse treatment using a cognitive behavioral treatment approach. Relapse prevention, reintegration, and vocational skill development are key components.


**Mabel Bassett Correctional Facility**
