1. Opening and Roll Call

Chair Gross called the regular meeting of the Oklahoma Board of Corrections (BOC) to order at 1:01 p.m. at the Oklahoma Department of Corrections on Thursday, May 1, 2014. Chair Gross asked the clerk to call the roll:

3. Approval of Board Meeting Minutes

- Regular Meeting on April 3, 2014

Chair Gross stated the minutes were provided to the Board prior to the meeting this date for review. He requested a motion to approve the minutes from the Regular Meeting on April 3, 2014.

Motion: Mr. Henke made a motion to approve the minutes and Mr. Burrage seconded the motion. The results of the roll call were: Mr. Burrage – yes; Mr. Gross – yes; Mr. Haynes – yes; Mr. Henke – yes; Mr. Roach – abstain; Mr. Ware – yes.

4. Director's Comments

Robert Patton, Director

Director Patton stated the Oklahoma Department of Corrections was saddened to report the death of Correctional Officer Ryan Peacock. At 6:59 a.m. on April 30, 2014, Lexington Assessment and Reception Center was notified by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol that Officer Peacock died of injuries sustained in a single-car accident on Highway 39 approximately 10 miles east of the facility. Officer Peacock was scheduled to work the day shift that date and was en route to the facility. Officer Peacock began his employment with the Oklahoma Department of Corrections in August 2013 and was noted as an outstanding officer. He was well liked by his coworkers and had a bright future with the agency. Officer Peacock was also an active reservist in the United States Marine Corps. He is survived by three children.

Director Patton then introduced Ms. Marilyn Davidson, who was selected as an Executive Assistant to the Director on April 24, 2014. She is a native Oklahoman, growing up in the Northeast part of the state. She received her B.A. from the University of Central Oklahoma and her M.B.A. from Oklahoma City University. While still in high school Ms. Davidson began volunteering on political campaigns and developed a passion for the process. Immediately after college she began working on campaigns and was hired as a legislative aide in the Oklahoma State Senate where she worked for both Senator Scott Pruitt and Senator Brian Crain. From there she served as the Government Relations Director for the American Heart Association, where she oversaw the passage of several pieces of legislation both locally and at the federal level. Her biggest accomplishment in this role was working with the Governor to pass a bill that would remove liability from schools who chose to open their facilities up for community use. It was the first

statewide bill of its kind. Most recently, Ms. Davidson worked at Saxum, a public relations and marketing firm, handling their public affairs. Director Patton then welcomed Ms. Davidson to the agency.

Director Patton also introduced Mr. David Cincotta, who has been selected as the General Counsel for the Oklahoma Department of Corrections as well as the Board of Corrections. He earned his Juris Doctorate from Oklahoma City University School of Law where he graduated with honors. Before law school, Mr. Cincotta earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Oklahoma State University with a major in Business Management. Before coming to work for the Oklahoma Department of Corrections, Mr. Cincotta was an Assistant District Attorney in Oklahoma County, and he was assigned to the Civil Division where he represented the county officials and the State of Oklahoma in a variety of cases. Director Patton welcomed Mr. Cincotta to the agency.

On April 16, 2014, Director Patton and executive staff toured Oklahoma State Penitentiary and Jackie Brannon Correctional Center. Additional facility tours are scheduled and Director Patton will continue traveling around the state to meet staff.

10. Population Update

**Laura Pitman, Ph.D., Deputy Director
Institutions, Division I**

Dr. Pitman provided the population update as of March 31, 2014:

Dr. Pitman also provided an update from the Population Committee which met earlier this date to discuss recent changes in the population. She noted the report provided to the committee was somewhat dated as efforts to increase the number of offenders brought in from county jails had amplified since the date of the report.

Dr. Pitman stated reducing the population to accommodate growth of new receptions was accomplished by restoration of lost earned credits. ODOC has statutory authority to take away and restore earned credits. Beginning on March 10, 2014, facilities were presented with lists of offenders who would be eligible for discharge from custody if their lost earned credits were restored. These lists continue to be provided every week. As of April 25, 2014, approximately 740 offenders had discharged because of the restoration of earned credits.

With the reduction in the population, receptions from county jails could be steadily increased but additional beds were needed as well. Original estimates were that 270 minimum- and 400 medium-security beds could be added temporarily. Since the Board meeting on April 3, 2014, all Fire Marshal visits have been completed and 672 temporary beds were approved to be added to day rooms and program/activity areas at the following facilities:

Dr. Pitman stated as of April 25, 2014, offender receptions since March 1, 2014, has totaled 2,611 offenders (2,319 males, 292 females). On February 28, 2014, the county jail backup list showed 1,901 offenders ready for reception and on April 25, 2014, it was down to 781 offenders which is a net decrease of 1,120 offenders. As of April 30, 2014, the county jail backup list had only 682 male offenders.

Chair Gross stated Dr. Pitman and other staff are doing great work in terms of reducing the number of offenders in county jail backup. Dr. Pitman attributed the success to the efforts of uniform and non-uniform staff alike. Chair Gross stated it was very impressive to hear the county jail backup list was less than 700 and he commended the staff again. No further questions or comments were made.

11. Legislative Update

Neville Massie, Legislative Liaison

Ms. Massie stated the Board had received the bill monitoring lists and she had met with the Public Policy/Public Affairs Committee earlier this date to discuss the list. The deadline for the bills to be heard on the floor of the opposite chamber was April 24, 2014. Of the original 4,300 bills, fewer than 475 remain alive and eligible for further consideration. Ms. Massie then provided updates on the following specific initiatives:

- HB 2486, allowing Life Without Parole offenders to access their mandatory savings, has passed the Senate and is waiting for acceptance of the Senate amendment in the House.
- SB 1842, cleaning up the language of the delayed sentencing statute, was signed by Governor Fallin on April 21, 2014, and will be effective November 1, 2014.
- The two pension reform bills are expected to go to conference committee for development of a final version. These two bills will convert state employees' pension systems from a defined benefit to a defined contribution for new employees hired after November 1, 2015.
- HB 3293, the employee pay bill, and HB 3294, the merit system overhaul, are both advancing and going to conference.
- HB 2804, the county jail reimbursement bill, is going to conference.
- SB 1248, the \$100 uniform monthly allowance bill, passed the House and will also be going to conference.

Ms. Massie stated the session must end by May 30, 2014, but it is expected they will try to finish up by May 23, 2014. No further questions or comments were made.

Provision of Food Services

In order to provide a healthy environment for incarcerated offenders, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections (DOC) has established a food service system that meets the standards of the Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH). Standardized diets will meet or exceed the recommended dietary allowance as approved by a qualified nutritionist or dietitian. (4-4316M, 2-CO-4C-01)

I. Food Service Standards

Written procedures shall be developed for the implementation of the following standards pertaining to food services.

A. Dietary Standards

Recommended dietary standards will be followed regarding the provision of nutritionally adequate, properly prepared, and appropriately delivered meals. (4-4316M)

B. Safety and Sanitation

Safety and sanitation standards will be enforced through inspections and continual monitoring to ensure adequate health protection for staff and offenders. (4-4324M, 4-4325)

C. Supplies and Equipment

A system for procurement and budgeting practices will be established to assure the availability of adequate food supplies and equipment. (4-4314)

D. Records Management

Record keeping and reporting procedures will be implemented to continually evaluate the delivery of services. (4-4315)

E. Delivery of Meal Service

Meals will be provided at least three times a day (including two hot meals) during regular meal times each 24 hour period, ensuring no more than 14 hours between the evening meal and breakfast. Meals shall be served under conditions to minimize regimentation and provide for direct supervision by staff members. (4-4326, 4-4328)

F. Diet Modification, Variations and Alternate Meal Service

Diet modifications, meal variations and alternate meal service require adherence to basic nutritional requirements. Meal service for those in restrictive housing will not be withheld nor will the standard diet be varied as a disciplinary measure. (4-4320, 4-4328)

G. Training

Staff and offenders who work in food service will be trained in the appropriate use of equipment and safety procedures. (4-4321-1)

Any exceptions to this policy statement will require prior written approval of the Board of Corrections.





Offender and Bed Distribution April 30, 2014




Offender Distribution by Security Level April 30, 2014




Percentage of Offenders in Secure and Non-Secure Beds
