FACTS SHEET

The first correctional system fully accredited by the American Correctional Association (ACA). Accredited in 1981

Seventeen institutions

Six community corrections centers, 15 work centers and 68 probation and parole offices contained within seven community corrections districts

3,908 employees as of December 31, 2013

The Oklahoma Department of Corrections is the second largest agency in the state of Oklahoma

More than 3,000 active volunteers serving all field units and administration as an extension of services provided by department staff

The total offender population was 26,713 (January 27, 2014)

Charles E. "Bill" Johnson Correctional Center in Alva is the first state operated prison built in Oklahoma in 18 years

Cost of \$15,213 to incarcerate one offender per year (FY2013 actual)

Highest female offender incarceration rate and fourth highest male incarceration rate in the country

Women prominent in Oklahoma corrections history include Kate Barnard, first Commissioner of Charities and Corrections; Mabel Bourne Bassett, third Commissioner of Charities and Corrections and Clara Waters, nations first female warden of an all-male prison

Oklahoma incarcerates 648 persons per 100,000 population compared with the national rate of 480 per 100,000 (Bureau of Justice Statistics, Prisoners in 2009)

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Probation and parole supervises more than 24,500 offenders, costing \$2.90 per offender per day

Oklahoma Correctional Industries (OCI) Industrial Production Unit employs 1,133 offenders in 32 operations; sales totalled \$15,862,962 (CY 2013)

Agri-Services employs 375 offenders, operating 10 agricultural production units, a meat processing unit, and a food processing center on 24,762 acres, making it the largest prison farm in the United States; sales totalled \$10,600,000 (FY2013)

1,244 offenders (adult and juveniles) participated in career-tech programs at 14 skill centers (CareerTech 2012 Annual Report)

Lakeside School at Oklahoma State Reformatory, nation's first accredited high school within a correctional facility

1,017 offenders completed the GED program (FY 2013)

First regimented offender disciplinary program (RID) in the United States (similar to boot camp) for first time, nonviolent offenders 18-24 years of age

Prisoner Public Works crews had 1,570 offenders providing services for various state, county, and municipal entities (December 31, 2013)

\$1,270,299 in restitution was paid to victims in fiscal year 2013.

474 male offenders and 38 female offender were age 20 or below
(Prison Population Analysis, January 30, 2014)

2,155 male offenders and 139 female offenders were age 56 and older
