

# FY 2012 Receptions, Incarcerations, and Releases




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# Receptions

In FY 2012, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections received 8,614 offenders who were sentenced to a term of incarceration as a result of their felony offenses. A summary of information concerning receptions follows. For additional information, please refer to the appendix.


## Reason for Receptions

The majority of the prison receptions for FY 2012 were for new offenses (73.1%). Probation revocations accounted for 25.4% of the receptions. Of the probation revocations, approximately half (48.9%) of the offenders were received with a new case. Parole violations constituted 1.0% of receptions. Escapees, interstate compact, and other receptions made up the remaining 0.5% of FY 2012 receptions.



## Demographics

Most of the offenders received into prison during FY 2012 were male (86.1%). Caucasians accounted for 56.1% of all prison receptions. African-Americans made up the second largest race category of offenders (25.2%), while Native Americans comprised 11.2% of the receptions. Hispanics made up 7.0% of the total receptions. The average age of offenders received was 33.9 years. Most of the offenders were single upon reception (45.5%). Offenders reporting their marital status as divorced made up 21.9% while married offenders made up 15.0% of the receptions. Many offenders (13.4%) chose not to indicate marital status. The majority of offenders had not completed high school (49.3%); however, 42.6% reported having a




high school diploma or GED and 1.3% reported having a college degree.

## Assessments

Upon reception, most offenders are assessed using the Level of Service Inventory - Revised (LSI-R) to determine their risk of reoffending. In FY 2012, most offenders' scores indicated a moderate (41.5%) or high (42.0%) level of risk. Only 6.0% of offenders' scores fell in the low risk category. The remaining 10.5% of offenders were not given the LSI-R at reception.


Offenders may also be given the Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) at admission



and/or while incarcerated to assess their skills and knowledge in mathematics, language arts, and reading. Results are reported in grade levels, ranging from 0.0 to 13.0. For example, if an offender scored a 5.9 in mathematics, he has acquired the skills and knowledge expected of an individual in the 9<sup>th</sup> month of their 5<sup>th</sup> grade year. Overall, in FY 2012 males scored 7.0 while females scored 8.1. Females scored highest in reading (8.8) and lowest in math (7.0). Males also scored highest in reading (7.6) but scored lowest in language arts (6.3).

## Offenses


For offenders sentenced with more than one offense, their controlling offense is determined by the offense with the greatest sentence length and the most serious of the offenses. The top five controlling



offenses for receptions in FY 2012 were: distributing a controlled dangerous substance (18.1%), possession of or obtaining a controlled dangerous substance (15.8%), assault (11.5%), larceny (8.8%), and burglary II (8.2%). Male offenders had the same five top controlling offenses. Female offenders' top five controlling offenses were: possession of or obtaining a controlled dangerous substance, distributing a controlled dangerous substance, larceny, assault, and forgery.

Drug offenses accounted for half of all (not just controlling) offenses in FY 2012. Violent crimes accounted for 34.2%, alcohol offenses made up 9.0%, and sex crimes comprised 6.8%. These categories are not mutually exclusive. For example, first-degree rape is both a sex crime and a violent crime.

## Sentences




The average sentence length for controlling offenses in FY 2012 was 6.9 years. Females received an average sentence of 6.0 years, while males received an average sentence of 7.1 years. These averages exclude delayed sentences, as well as life, life without parole, and death sentences. Of all receptions, 12.8% of offenders were required to serve 85% of their sentence before being eligible to receive earned credits or be considered for parole. Prison receptions carrying sentences of life or life without parole accounted for 1.5%. There were no offenders received with a death sentence in FY 2012.

# Incarcerations

At the end of FY 2012, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections was supervising 25,893 incarcerates. This number does not include those in county jail back-up awaiting reception into prison (approximately 500 offenders). A summary of information concerning incarcerations follows. For additional information, please refer to the appendix.

## Demographics




Males made up 89.8% of the incarcerated population in FY 2012, while females represented 10.2% of all incarcerates. Of those incarcerated, 53.6% were Caucasian, 28.9% were African-American, 9.3% were Native American, and 7.6% were Hispanic. Most incarcerates were between the ages of 26 and 35, with an average age of 37.8 years. Upon admission, the majority of incarcerated offenders reporting being single (34.7%) or divorced (24.4%) and reporting having not completed high school (50.9%).


## Assessments

The LSI-R scores at admission for incarcerated offenders in FY 2012 indicated that 38.0% of incarcerates were high risk, while 34.1% were moderate risk.

Only 7.5% of offenders were low risk. The most recent TABE scores for incarcerated individuals indicated an average total score of 7.0, with the highest scores on reading (8.2) and the lowest scores on language arts (6.8). Females scored highest on reading (9.3) and lowest on math (7.6). Males scored highest on reading (8.2) and lowest on language arts (6.8).



## Offenses



The top five controlling offenses for incarcerates were: distributing a controlled dangerous substance (18.2%), assault (10.9%), possession of or obtaining a controlled dangerous substance (9.7%), robbery (8.7%), and rape (7.4%). Males had the same top five controlling offenses. The top five controlling offenses for females were: distributing a controlled dangerous substance, possession of


or obtaining a controlled dangerous substance, larceny, sex crimes, and assault.

Most incarcerates' offenses (taking into account all offenses, not just controlling) were violent (52.5%). Drug crimes accounted for 38.1% of all offenses, while 14.2% were sex-related crimes and 4.1% were crimes involving alcohol. As previously mentioned, these categories are not mutually exclusive, meaning that a crime may fall into more than one category.


## Sentences

The average sentence length of those incarcerated in FY 2012 was 15.4 years. Females were serving an average of 9.8 years, while males were serving an average of 16.1 years. These averages exclude delayed sentences, as well as life, life without parole, and death sentences. Of the total offenders incarcerated, 26.9% were serving 85% of their sentence before being eligible for parole or earned credits.

Offenders serving a life sentence accounted for 7.1% of incarcerates and 3.0% of offenders were serving life without parole.

housed in maximum security.

The majority (62.1%) of incarcerates were housed in a state institution in FY 2012. Private institutions held 18.7% of incarcerates, 9.9% were located at a community corrections center or a community work center, 4.7% were in halfway houses, and 2.7% were monitored by the electronic monitoring program (EMP) or GPS.

Most offenders were held in medium security (41.8%), while 31.7% were in minimum security, and 14.1% were under community supervision. Only 7.1% of incarcerates were


# Releases

At the end of FY 2012, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections released 8,125 offenders. A summary of information concerning releases follows. For additional information, please refer to the appendix.

## Type of Release

Most offenders who were released in FY 2012 were discharged to the street (52.4%). Offenders released on probation accounted for 41.5% of all releases, while those who were paroled accounted for 6.1% of releases.

## Demographics




Most of the offenders released in FY 2012 were male (85.7%). Of those released, 55.6% of the offenders were Caucasian, 26.6% were African-American, 10.7% were Native American, and 6.6% were Hispanic. Most of the released offenders were between the ages of 26 and 35, with an average age of 36.0 years. The majority of released offenders reported being single (43.4%) or divorced (20.4%). At admission, 51.3% of released offenders had not completed high school and 41.9% had earned a high school diploma or GED.

## Assessments

The most recent LSI-R scores for released offenders in FY 2012 indicated that 43.7% of incarcerates were moderate risk, while 40.6% were high risk.

Offenders who were released had an average total TABE score of 7.4. The highest scores were in reading (8.2) and the lowest were in language arts (7.0). Females scored highest on reading (9.3) and lowest on math (7.5), while males scored highest on reading (8.0) and lowest on language arts (6.8).



## Offenses


The top five controlling offenses for released offenders were: distributing a controlled dangerous substance (16.5%), possession of or obtaining a controlled dangerous substance (16.4%), assault (10.9%), larceny (9.2%), and burglary II (8.8%). Males had the same top five controlling offenses. The top five controlling offenses for female releases were: possession of or obtaining a controlled dangerous substance, distributing a controlled dangerous substance, forgery, larceny, and assault.

Most released offenders had been incarcerated for drug crimes (43.3%). Violent crimes accounted for 28.0% of all offenses, while 9.6% were crimes involving alcohol and 5.8% were sex-related crimes. These numbers include all offenses, not just controlling offenses. Additionally, these categories are not mutually exclusive, meaning that a crime may fall into more than one category.

## Sentences

The average sentence length of those released in FY 2012 was 6.4 years. Females were serving an average of 5.4 years, while males were serving an average of 6.5 years. These averages exclude delayed sentences, as well as life, life without parole, and death sentences. Of the total offenders released, 7.8% were serving 85% of their sentence before being eligible for parole or earned credits. Upon release, offenders had served an average of 3.2 years. Many times, offenders serve less time than their original sentence dictates due to earned credits (good time credits) and parole.

## Facilities and Security Levels



Most offenders were released from state institutions (52.3%). Offenders released from halfway houses accounted for 15.5% of releases, while those released from community corrections centers and community work centers accounted for 15.2%. The majority of incarcerated were released from minimum security (39.9%) or community supervision (30.5%).
