





In August 2011 James Havard pled into the Adair County Community Sentencing program on assault, and possession of methamphetamine charges. James had previous convictions, but had not been in trouble in eight years. It was obvious he had relapsed on drugs. He admitted he had a problem and was excited about getting help with his addiction. Havard was admitted to CAAIR in Jay Oklahoma for substance abuse treatment. Relapsing while in treatment, he was given the opportunity to restart, and successfully completed the program at CAAIR. Upon completion of CAAIR, Havard accepted a job with Simmons Food in Westville, Oklahoma. Havard stayed with Simmons after completing probation. He received a promotion and was transferred to Missouri City, Missouri. Mr. Havard has repeatedly expressed gratitude to Community Sentencing for helping him get the treatment he needed, and helping him get his life on track.


Kevin K.

Kevin K. was sentenced to community sentencing in September of 2013. Kevin admittedly offered every excuse in the book to report to his probation officer at the last minute, avoiding treatment, and completely avoiding a monthly Review Court. Kevin would purposely report the afternoon of Review Court and then be absent from Review Court that evening. In December 2013 he began attending substance abuse treatment with a local provider, and completed treatment that following March. He never had a positive urinalysis and was always employed; however, Kevin was “skating” through the program. Sometime in September 2014 Kevin was faced with a new challenge, his children were taken from his ex-wife’s custody and placed into DHS custody in another state. Kevin did a 180 degree turn in the program. Kevin is currently working with DHS in two states, attending and paying for his required stipulations to get custody of his children, meeting with his probation officer at a convenient time, attending the Review Court he so often avoided, and has remained substance free.


Dawn Wilson


Tonya Smith

On December 2012 she was accepted in the Community Sentencing program. This entailed 6 months of group treatment every Thursday and seeing Allan Dupuis for individual counseling every 2 weeks. She learned why she used drugs. She started changing her mind thought so she would not use again. She has learned to set healthy boundaries with everyone around her. She states, *"The best thing was that I did not use. I have learned so much about myself because of this program."* She wished everyone in the program would walk away with all the tools that she now has. *"I have 2 years clean and I have just signed a lease on my new house."*


Gary Hendrix

I continued to be involved in abusive relationships until almost two years ago. I was sentenced to Community Sentencing on February 8, 2013. I spent eight months at the Valliant House and it changed my life. The staff never gave up on me and helped me learn my value and that I am capable of having worth. Today, I am employed, have my own apartment, and continue to be active in my recovery. Judge Denney gave me a second chance and now I know it is because I am worth it. My success did not come without hardwork. My biggest challenge was learning how to deal with my pain. As an addict, I learned to avoid my pain by drinking my way to the bottom of the bottle. My support system and advocates helped me learn how to work through my pain and live in the present. Today I am a survivor of domestic violence and a recovery addict. I am repairing relationships with my parents and my children. I could not be where I am today without the accountability and support of the Community Sentencing Program."

"My name is David Steakley. I was addicted to meth for most of my life before I came into Community Sentencing in 2012. When I first started this program it was really hard for me because of its structure because before the program I didn't really have any structure. When I started, I had a 9 p.m. curfew, attended counseling twice a week, called in everyday to see if I had to take a drug test, go to court once a month and report to my probation officer once a month. I had to keep a job and pay my fines, those were all my responsibilities. If I didn't follow the rules, I was sanctioned. So for me to complete this program I would have to make a choice to change my life or live the life I hated before I started the program. Once I decided I wanted a better life, it seemed to get a little bit easier. I learned no one can change overnight. But if you give them the opportunity and the tools they need, it is possible to overcome the addiction and take back your life. It's not an easy road, but the outcome is worth it. So to the people that gave me the opportunity and the tools and didn't give up on me, I'm forever grateful. Thank you for caring."


Misty Mitts

Everrett Herndon



Finally Everrett beat his addiction, he last tested positive for marijuana on August 20, 2014. Everrett has completed substance abuse treatment and is attending anger management. He has been sober for 4 months and maintains distance from those with anti-social and addictive personalities. 
Lisa Misksell

Jared Williams


Jared Williams was sentenced in November 2011 for possession of a firearm after previous adjudication and assault and battery on a police officer. Mr. Williams stopped reporting and had moved. His family did not know where he was but his wife and child were with him. One night Mr. Williams began getting text messages from Mr. Williams that were close to threatening and blaming me for his actions and use of drugs. He refused to tell me where he was but stated he was not in Bartlesville. The next day, Mr. Williams was admitted to ICU in a Tulsa hospital where he remained for 7 days in critical condition due to the use of K2. The family advised they believed he was going to die.

The courts allowed Mr. Williams to go to inpatient treatment at 12 & 12 where he received treatment for co-occurring problems. Mr. Williams then entered the after care program and began working and attending meetings nightly for the next six months. Mr. Williams was released and remained living and working for the same construction company. Mr. Williams reported regularly and his whole attitude had changed about drug use. Mr. Williams successfully completed supervision March 2014 and now lives in Stillwater, away from old friendships and has his own construction business.






Finally, after a year of positive urinalysis and many attempts by community sentencing staff, Ray was taken before his sentencing judge and given a 5 day jail sanction right before Christmas. After spending five days in jail, Ray finally admitted to having a problem with cocaine. Ray was referred to the Bridges to Life program in Oklahoma City and it "fit." Ray was originally in a group of 15-20 men...he and one other participant are the only ones that completed the program successfully. The staff at Bridges to Life "promoted" Ray and by the end of the program he was "working the front desk" and assisting others in their transition into and through the program that had been such a benefit to him. Since his completion, Ray has maintained over a year of sobriety and has rekindled his relationship with his daughter.

I had been prescribed Xanax and Valium, but now take no medication and do not do drugs or alcohol. CSP kept me on the straight and narrow and from my biggest fear of going to prison. I continue to fight the addiction to drugs."





