

FROM STATE CAPITOL BUILDING TO CONFERENCE PARKING


...you will drive to 825 Research Parkway.
Park. Catch Shuttle.

Ride comfortably to conference site. Return.

Due to extremely limited parking, participants only access to the conference site is via the **FREE** shuttle service. We have taken strides to make this an easy-as-possible transition.

Directions below are from the Capitol to the Parking/ Shuttle Area - Shuttle service will loop back & forth to Mini Conference (see designated times below).

1. Drive Southbound on Lincoln Boulevard
2. Go straight through the intersection of **Lincoln BLVD & NE 8th St.**
3. Turn **Right** on **Research Parkway** - go 0.1 mile
4. ★ Arrive at **University Research Parkway Parking Lot**



Follow the blue line into the parking garage. The Red dot is where the shuttle is located (Level 2). There will be signs directing you to this dot through the building and parking garage. The shuttle will be labeled for the conference. Once on the shuttle you will receive a token to get out of the garage once the conference is over.



In SFY 2013, there were 11,418 substantiated reports of child abuse and neglect in the state of Oklahoma.

Prevent Child Abuse and Neglect by Supporting Home Visitation Services

Home visitors regularly monitor mother and child health, help parents better interact with and nurture children, track children's development, and connect families with health and other resources they need.

Taxpayers reap the benefits when child abuse, welfare dependence, crime and school failure are prevented. Home visiting is proven to return more to our economy than we spend. The most definitive study shows that **we save over \$5 for every \$1 we spend** on Nurse-Family Partnership. A detailed study by the State of Washington found average returns of \$2.24 per dollar spent.

In 2010, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) found 13 **home visiting programs that are proven to improve child and family outcomes**. Oklahoma has long invested in several of these successful programs through a **COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM OF EVIDENCE-BASED HOME VISITING in OKLAHOMA** including:

- ✳ **Nurse-Family Partnership** (Children First in Oklahoma) - Oklahoma State Department of Health
- ✳ **Healthy Families America** (Start Right in Oklahoma) - Oklahoma State Department of Health
- ✳ **Parents as Teachers** - Oklahoma State Department of Education
- ✳ **SafeCare** – Oklahoma State Department of Human Services

All of these programs work to prevent child abuse and neglect, support families parenting young children and reduce challenges such as developmental delays that increase stress on families.

Home visiting makes dramatic contributions to our economy by reducing mothers' likelihood of receiving public assistance, increasing mothers' educational goals, lowering children's likelihood of being classified "at risk" and decreasing low rankings in health indicators for mothers and children.



- Supervised visits and exchanges




STRENGTHENING FAMILIES

Frequently Asked Questions

Is there an income standard?
No, there is no income standard for foster parents. However, you must be able to provide a safe and stable home for the child.

Where do you have to live?
You must live in the Chickasaw Nation or have a valid Oklahoma driver's license and a current Oklahoma address.

Can you foster more than one child?
Yes, you can foster more than one child. However, you must have the space and resources to care for multiple children.

Do you have to be Chickasaw?
No, you do not have to be Chickasaw. However, you must be a resident of Oklahoma.

Do you have to own your own home?
No, you do not have to own your own home. However, you must have a safe and stable living environment.

Do you have to be married?
No, you do not have to be married. However, you must be at least 21 years old.

Do you get paid to be a foster parent?
Yes, you receive a stipend to help cover the costs of caring for the child. This includes food, clothing, and medical expenses.

THE MAGNITUDE OF THE SOLUTION

The Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) Study findings are the largest public health discovery of our time. ACEs affect a lifetime of health, safety and prosperity. This talk will weave together findings from neuroscience, epidemiology, resilience research and systems thinking and provide examples of how professionals and community residents are using this science to promote health in this and future generations. Participants will learn about the progressive nature of adversity – from historical trauma and ACEs to peer and adult trauma and suffering – and about three systems for promoting resilience and creating trans-formative and sustainable change. The magnitude of the solution for shifting the trajectory of public health is in our hands.

ACE PREVENTION IN COMPLEX ADAPTIVE SYSTEMS

ACEs, neuroscience and resilience research findings provide us with new information we can apply to solving complex problems. Participants will discuss ways that toxic stress can make it harder to be in various roles - from customer or client to parent or community leader, and explore intervention strategies and tools for interrupting transmission of adversity. We will focus on processes that employ rhythm, ritual, and trauma sensitive ways of working with people to achieve population-level impacts.

YOU MAY BE WHAT THEY WERE THEN: A LOOK AT YOUR FAMILY THROUGH THE USE OF A GENOGRAM!

The purpose of identifying trends over 3-4 generations is to become aware that they are a part of their family history. Trends may include health/illness issues, addictions, family violence, professions, hobbies/ recreational interests, namesakes, divorces/no divorces, education and possible others such as military, geographic location, twins etc. A narrative or journal includes a discussion of the trends and is helpful in either supporting or intervening to determine if the trend will continue in future generations. A valuable aspect of constructing a genogram is that it is an orderly way of obtaining a family history and organizing that history so the family members and/or therapists can look at it together. The trends identified will be invaluable as the family looks at the past and uses it to make plans and changes for the future.
