

UPDATE - Debra Andersen's (SSO) work with PEW Charitable Trust

- Working with PEW Charitable Trust and the State of Oklahoma to develop legislation to support the Home Visitation Programs around Oklahoma.
- PEW: Supports enacting accountability legislation that includes measurements across the system of Home Visitation programs so legislators can understand the big picture.
- Met with ten legislators and all were receptive to the concept of the legislation.
- Representative McCullough has indicated he does not plan to introduce home visitation legislation next year.
- Stakeholders will be asked to inform the legislation
- PEW only has ideas and guidelines. Their goal is to help states develop robust accountable HV programs.
- Four things HVLAC can do to help:
 1. Identify and provide input
 2. Data collection
 3. Messaging
 4. Outcomes

- All Data is on the State level , not County Level

- Demographics
 - As of July 2012, 261,958 children under age 5 lived in Oklahoma
 - Majority are White or Hispanic/Latino
 - The number of Hispanic/Latino in state are steadily rising (15% in 2012)
 - 12% are from immigrant Families
- Economic Well- Being
 - 24% of all Oklahoma children live in poverty
 - 1 in 10 children live in extreme poverty
 - 28% of all children under 5 years live in poverty
 - Median income for families with children \$50, 300 (2012)
 - Unemployment rate is about 4.6 %
 - Government Assistance
 - SNAP recipients: 889,137
 - TANF recipients: 26,489
 - WIC recipients 1,087,731



 - 85% of brain development under 4
 - 5th hungriest state
 - Missed meals
 - Wet diapers

- Median income for families with children: \$50,300 (2012)
- Unemployment rate of parents: 4.0% (2012)


Education

Early Childhood:

- **1 in 4** parents (25%) of children under 6 with developmental delays had predicative concerns about their child's development (2011-2012)

Education

Minorities have lower reading achievement levels than White 4th grade students



Economic Well-Being

Government Assistance:

- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients: 889,137
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) recipients: 26,489 (SFY 2013)
- Women, Infants & Children (WIC) recipients: 1,087,731 (FFY 2013)


Education

Primary and Secondary:

- Teens (16-19yrs) not in school and not HS graduates: **6%** (2009-2011)
- HS graduates 25-29 yrs old who have completed Bachelor's degree or higher: **24%**

Education

The number of children who speak another language in the home is rising (12%)




Education

Early Childhood:

- Children 3-4 years not enrolled in Pre-K: **59%** (2009-2011)
- Of those not enrolled in Pre-K, **63%** are living in poverty
- Children under 6 years that received a developmental screening: **28%** (2011-2012)


Education

The majority (**70%**) of 4th grade students read below proficiency levels*



Family & Community

1 in 10 (12%) of children live in areas of concentrated poverty; these kids are more likely to be minorities. (2007-2011)



Family & Community

- **1 in 3 (35%)** children live in single-parent families (2012)
- Children in the care of their grandparents: **5%** (2012)
- Children in kinship care: **4%**


Health

- **12%** of children birth to 3 years were born to parents who had received a home visit (2011-2012)
- **19%** of children have **one or more** emotional, behavioral, or developmental condition (2011-2012)

Safety & Risky Behaviors

Over **half** of confirmed maltreatment cases were for **neglect**

Family & Community

- Teen birth rate for 15-19 year olds: **47.3/1,000**



Safety & Risky Behaviors


Juvenile Justice:

- **1,187** juveniles confined to residential group homes or secure institutions (SFY 2012)
- **11,494** juveniles had an intake completed in SFY 2012
 - **7,100** were first-time juveniles
 - **1,376** were violent crime related arrests

Safety & Risky Behaviors

Currently, **42%** of children in out-of-home placement are **under 5 years old**

Percent of children in out-of-home placement by age group (SFY 2013)




Health

- **13%** of children are born preterm (2011)
- **8%** of children birth to 5 years were uninsured (2011)
- **30.8%** of 2 year-olds were **not** fully immunized at 24 months (2011)
- **25%** of children under 18 are **at increased risk** of a chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional condition and require services beyond that required by children generally

Safety & Risky Behaviors

Nearly **half** of confirmed maltreatment cases are for children **under 4 years old**


Percent of confirmed child maltreatment victims by age group (2011)

Currently, **37%** of children awaiting adoption from foster care are **under 5 years old**
