**Specific activities towards objectives completed this quarter:** On January 12-13, 2012, Oklahoma sent a team to the federal Region IV and VI Infant Mortality Summit hosted by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in partnership with multiple partners to include the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials, March of Dimes, and others. The State Health Officer (Dr. Terry Cline) and the state Title V Director (Suzanna Dooley) were required members of the team with other team members being Steve Ronck (OSDH), Paul Patrick (OSDH), Nico Gomez (Oklahoma Health Care Authority), Barbara O'Brian (Office of Perinatal Quality Improvement, OU Dept of OB-GYN), and LaWanna Halstead (Oklahoma Hospital Association). The team learned of national and state specific evidenced-based strategies as well as promising practices. The team spent time identifying steps to enhance Oklahoma's current statewide initiative with priority areas discussed: more effective/efficient use of data to inform policy and practice; health care policy and services; expanding efforts and engaging top leadership in insurance, health care, business, faith-based, tribal, other governmental organizations, etc., through a state summit (currently being planned for September 2012).
