





Monthly Sales Subject to Tax:

From January 1980 to August of 2008, with the exception of a downturn between 1983 and 1987, the Southwest WIA has experienced consistent and positive growth. Average monthly sales subject to tax have increased from \$35 million in 1980 to \$94 million in 2008. Since August of 2008, the monthly sales subject to tax for the Southwest WIA had declined by \$13 million up to October 2010.



Monthly Sales Subject to Tax:

Custer County is responsible for twenty-nine percent of the total sales subject to tax for the Southwest WIA for 2010. Beckham County came in second at twenty-seven percent, while Jackson County came in third at twenty-six percent. The remaining counties each contributed between two and six percent.



Workforce:

The Southwest WIA's available workforce has been anything but consistent in the last twenty-one years. Though the size of the workforce fluctuated, the overall trend has been positive. For the last few years the Southwest WIA has experienced consistent and significant gains in its annual workforce. *Between 1990 and 2009, the Southwest WIA increased its available workforce by 6,499 workers, an increase of over thirteen percent. Only from 2009 to 2010 the Southwest WIA decreased its annual workforce by 514 workers.*

Workforce:

Custer County is responsible for twenty-nine percent of the Southwest WIA's workforce. Jackson County is responsible for twenty-three percent, Beckham County is responsible for twenty-one percent, and Washita County is responsible for eleven percent. The remaining counties are responsible for between two and seven percent of the workforce distribution.





Workforce:

The Southwest WIA's average annual unemployment rate between 1990 and 2010 was, for the most part, below both the statewide and the national averages. The Southwest WIA's average annual unemployment rate between 1990 and 2010 was 4.21%. During that same time period the national average annual unemployment rate was 5.83%, or 1.62 percentage points higher than the Southwest WIA's, and the statewide average annual unemployment rate was 4.9%



Workforce:

Between 1990 and 2008 each county in the Southwest WIA had fluctuating levels of unemployment. There was not one county that had a consistent unemployment rate in comparison to the other counties. In 1990 Beckham County had one of the highest rates of unemployment but finished 2008 with the lowest rate. Greer and Kiowa Counties had the lowest rates of unemployment in 1990, but had the highest rates of unemployment in 2008. At 3.27%, Roger Mills County had the lowest average unemployment rate for this time period. *All counties experienced a large increase in the annual unemployment rate from 2008 to 2010. At 3.38%, Roger Mills County had the lowest average unemployment rate between 1990 and 2010.*



Per Capita Personal Income:

The Southwest WIA's per capita personal income has realized a positive increase between the years of 1986 and 2008. The Southwest WIA's per capita personal income increased somewhat more rapidly between 1997 and 2008 than it had between 1986 and 1996. The per capita personal income increased \$20,663 over this 23 year time period to \$31,879. But it decreased by \$1,972 from 2008 to 2009. The national per capita personal income was 32.53% higher than the WIA at \$39,635 in 2009.

Per Capita Personal Income:

Between 1986 and 2009 the Southwest WIA's per capita personal income trailed that of the state average. Though both followed a similar trend, the Southwest WIA's per capita personal income was on average \$3,580 less than the statewide average.

Per Capita Personal Income



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
Per Capita Personal Income:

Of the eight counties that the Southwest WIA is comprised of, none exceeded the national or statewide per capita income averages. For the last four years, Washita County has had the lowest per capita income, while Roger Mills County has had the highest. Between 1986 and 2009, Washita County has had the lowest per capita income, while Jackson County has had the highest.


Average Annual Salary:

Between 2001 and 2010 the Southwest WIA followed the statewide and national trend in average annual salaries. The Southwest WIA's average annual salary trailed the statewide annual average by \$6,155 during that same time period. The Southwest WIA's average annual salary increased from \$21,897 in 2001 to \$32,369 in 2010. This is an increase of 47.82% or \$10,472.

Average Annual Salary:

In 2003, Beckham County's average annual salary began to increase at a more rapid rate than the other seven counties, surpassing the statewide average in 2006. *Between 2006 and 2010, its average annual salary was above that level of the statewide except 2009.* Harmon and Kiowa Counties had the lowest average annual salary, followed by Greer County. The remaining counties had similar annual average salaries and followed a similar trend.


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Total Annual Wages for Southwest WIA 2001-2010 (in millions)




Total Wages Paid Annually:

Total wages paid annually have increased steadily from 2003 to 2008 for the Southwest WIA. *Between 2008 and 2010, total wage paid annually first decreased and then increased for the Southwest WIA.* In 2001, employers paid a payroll of \$815 million. By 2010, that figure had increased to \$1.273 billion. This equates to a 56.13% increase in total wages paid over those ten years.



Total Wages Paid Annually:

The Southwest WIA's total annual wages paid for 2010 were \$1.273 billion. The Southwest WIA contributed 2% of the state's total annual wages paid in 2010. The total annual wages paid in Oklahoma in 2010 were \$56.797 billion dollars.

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
Number of Business Establishments:

The Southwest WIA has experienced positive growth in the number of business establishments located within its boundaries. Between the years 2002 and 2004, 2008 and 2009, though, the Southwest WIA did experience small decreases in the number of business establishments. Between the years of 2001 and 2010, the Southwest WIA realized a 6.53% increase in the number of business establishments, equivalent to 196 establishments.
