**03. Introduction of guests and visitors.**

**04. Comments from guests and visitors.**

This item is included within the agenda to allow time for public comment to the OSRC Board of Commissioners. Comments are limited to three minutes per speaker. This agenda item allows NO ACTION may be taken by Commissioners.

Chairman Hilsher welcomed and opened the podium for comments from the guests and visitors. No one had any comments.

**05. Consideration and discussion, vote to approve, amend or take other action approving minutes from May 19, 2015 OSRC Special Business Meeting.**

Chairman Hilsher talked about May 19, 2015 minutes. Chairman Hilsher indicated that the minutes were accurate in his opinion and asked if anyone had any amendments, corrections or revisions. No one commented and he entertained a motion to approve. Commissioner Michael Fuhr motioned to approve the minutes as presented. Commissioner Steve Randall seconded the motion.

**06. Administrator's Report.**

Administrator Fite stated his report would be brief since the agenda is "jam packed". Mr. Fite kept his report to the following:

- Introduced Delia Haak, Illinois River Watershed Partnership who he said had been appointed by President Obama as the new federal chair for the Arkansas-Oklahoma Arkansas River Compact Commission (Compact). Mr. Fite stated that 2015 Annual Compact Meeting would be held September 23-24 at the new Holiday Inn Express in Tahlequah. He then addressed a question from Chairman Hilsher if the Compact Meeting was open to the public. Administrator Fite replied that both the committee meeting on the 23<sup>rd</sup> and full Compact Meeting on the 24<sup>th</sup> is open to the public to attend.
- Reminded those in attendance that the date of the annual river clean-up is Saturday, September 12<sup>th</sup>, 2015.
- Informed Commissioners that in October, the Bi-state Arkansas-Oklahoma Stressor Test Committee will meet at the Grand River Dam Authority, Langley, OK. In addition, he said Dr. Ryan King and his Team from Baylor University will attend and present an update on their work.
- Informed everyone that the 2016 OSRC Budget Work Program had not been finalized as Office of Management and Enterprise Systems had experienced considerable issues with the new accounting software.
- Acknowledged that an agreement had been consummated with Diamondhead Resort and War Eagle Resort to utilize Edmondson Public Access Area to launch/retrieve commercial flotation devices.
- He updated Commissioners about the ongoing talks with the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation to pick up at least one quarter of OSRC-USGS Water Quality Monitoring Contract that is looking pretty favorable and that Oklahoma Conservation Commission has paid for the first quarter of the water monitoring, along with cost of portable toilets for this fiscal year.
- He briefly reported on activities of the Maintenance Department, its budget and abatement of litter from the river and its impacts.

In wrapping up his report, Mr. Fite quickly recapped on several items:

- That the 100 Temporary CFD Licenses that had been previously authorized for Arrowhead Resort, that Mr. Jack Spears had decided not to follow through on the purchase/issuance.
- Observed that 2015 summer season seemed to be the toughest one for the OSRC, CFD Operations and others involved with river.

- Stated work was being wrapped up on the new Combs Bridge replacement and the schedule for demolition of the old bridge.
- Brought attention to celebration of 15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the J.T. Nickel Family Nature Preserve.
- He stated that the commercial flotation device operations should expect distribution of their 2016 CFD Licensing Renewal Application Packages soon.
- And, he reminded everyone that the election for the Adair, Cherokee and Delaware County Representatives to the OSRC are coming up this fall.

At the conclusion of his report, Administrator Fite introduced and talked about Senator Wayne Shaw.

#### **07. Ranger Department Report.**

Captain Bill James talked about the Ranger Department and all the things they enforced this year and the different approach they took. He spoke about the zero tolerance enforcement and how the float operators want the rangers to be present on the river. Captain James referred to legislation the Governor had vetoed and how it affects the people getting tickets.

He talked about the summer and specifically an issue where rafts being tied together. He said in dealing with the DA's Office, he said when a ticket is written upon a conviction it's a criminal misdemeanor. The Governor vetoed the legislation that would have made such convictions an administrative violation that would not be reflected on the individual's court records.

Captain James spoke about needed equipment losses that have occurred and what has been replaced. He shared his thoughts about the replacement of a new ranger(s) in the coming future.

Captain James expressed his need/want for two motorized kayaks and the possibilities it creates for the Ranger Department. He talked about the kayaks and explained why they would be useful. He discussed the stability and cost of the kayak. He said they could be used in life-saving situations.

Captain James wrapped up his report by asking everyone in attendance if possession of alcohol beverages over 3.2% alcohol is illegal on the river. He said it was not, only is it illegal to consume it on the river. He said OSRC needs to adopt a rule prohibiting possession of alcohol in excess of 3.2%.

Chairman Hilsher followed-up saying that he was really excited to see the write-up in the newspaper about the River Ranger "Undercover" Enforcement Task Force. Captain Bill James responded that the media had a lot to do with the success of the Task Force.

#### **08. Presentation by Dr. Lowell Caneday, Oklahoma State University related to proposal to conduct a recreational carrying capacity study of the Illinois River during the 2016 float season. This agenda item also includes possible action by OSRC Commissioners to approve, amend or take other action.**

Chairman Hilsher introduced Dr. Lowell Caneday and his team.

Dr. Lowell Caneday presented the Oklahoma State University proposal to conduct a recreational carrying capacity study of the Illinois River during the 2016 float season. He said it helps to establish a parameter for management and everyday operations. He said there is a great need to update the current information on the Illinois River Management Plan. He said that when the management plan was established; they set the carrying capacity for 3,900 permits, under the conditions at that time. He said the data is 15 years old and the floating equipment has changed, technology, people and behaviors have changed. He said there is a need for a new carrying capacity study. Dr. Caneday said he is retired but that he has a team in place to take over and get started.

Dr. Lowell Caneday explained the scope of the carrying capacity study. Carrying capacity is commonly defined as "the amount or type of use an area can sustain without unacceptable change." In most carrying capacity studies related to rivers, there are four types of capacity that are addressed: (1) physical carrying capacity, deals with geospatial technology such as GPS data collection and GIS mapping to establish the geographic context of the river corridor; (2) facility (design) carrying capacity, which is based on man-made developments essential for recreational activity including put-in and take-out sites, parking areas, public access locations, and campgrounds, each with their included amenities; (3) social carrying capacity, which is a function of changes in use levels (management parameters) and numbers or types of encounters experienced by visitors (experience parameters) and; (4) ecological carrying capacity. The first three are encompassed in his proposal. For ecological carrying capacity he said OSRC may wish to seek out Dr. Tracy Boyer, OSU Economist for a separate and independent proposal and agreement. He said any OSU Study must be approved by institutional review board for the study to advance. Dr. Caneday explained the process to get started. He said the soonest time frame to get started would be September and final data report being July 2016. The proposal that Dr. Caneday has put together requires signatures.

Kathy Ryals said that she listened to the whole presentation and questioned the reason why Dr. Caneday did not address private landowners and their opinion. He responded that his study will not include landowners but it will be public so the landowners can find the information and participate. Outfitters by contrast will be provided all the information.

Chairman Hilsher talked to Dr. Caneday about adding the landowners to the study and that he thought it was important. He also talked about the budget and asked if there were grants that could be obtained for the study. Dr. Caneday said he hadn't pursued the option and he wasn't sure. Dr. Caneday said the cost of the study was \$28,100, and then explained what the cost is for.

Rod Foster asked Dr. Caneday if this was a follow-up to the study done in previous 1994 management plan. Dr. Caneday said it is an updating of this one component to the river management plan.

Dr. Caneday explained the process to everyone. He said when they did the last study in 1994 and 1995, most of the water craft were canoes, a few kayaks, and a few rafts were present. That whole mix has changed dramatically, so the idea for the study was that one watercraft would be used once a day. He said what has happened is the number of permits; 3,900 was originally perceived as the carrying capacity back then. He said that we don't know what the numbers are so that's why we need to do the study.

Rod Foster asked Chairman Hilsher if the 1994 management plan is still in effect. Chairman Hilsher replied that it was still in effect, but hasn't been updated. Chairman Hilsher talked about the fact that there has been a change in the flotation device mix. He said that rafts and kayaks are taking over and it is impacting the mix as well.

Dr. Caneday said that what has changed, as well, that needs to be taken into consideration is the fact that society has changed, which in turn impacts the mix.

Chairman Hilsher said that one of the things in the management plan from 1994 was part of the strategy that an ongoing research program should be administered to assess changes, visitation patterns, and recreational patterns on the Illinois River.

Rod Foster asked if we could not obtain this same information by going back through the permitting process where we could track to see how many people were actually boated, instead of doing the study.

Administrator Fite said we can 1983 through 2008. He said that the management plan was adopted in 1998.

Chairman Hilsher said there are a number of ways to track the number of people on the river, when we talked about the proposed rulemaking a key requirement will be that operators tell us the number of people who will be floating with them.

Chairman Hilsher said that the number of permits that is subject to being issued is based on the matter of the upcoming OSRC Administrative Rulemaking.

Following the discussion Chairman Hilsher motioned to approve the study. Commissioner John Larson seconded the motion.

**09. Presentation of results from the 2015 Commercial Flotation Device Operator Opinion Survey conducted by State Senator Wayne Shaw-District 3. Presented by Mr. Walter Duke on behalf Senator Shaw.**

Senator Shaw stated how much he enjoyed conducting the survey. He stated that he found there are three big issues on the river, (1) economics (2) water quality and (3) safety. He spoke about public access points and stressed that all user groups must have access to them. He said he thought there needed to be better signage in the river corridor. He also addressed the need for more law enforcement. The Senator emphasized that the Oklahoma Highway Patrol should step up enforcement on state highway 10 to allow rangers to focus on the river. He said survey results confirmed that the OSRC had done a good job related to influencing improved water quality. In concluding his survey results, Senator Shaw that Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and

Oklahoma Office of Commerce should become more involved to give adequate/appropriate press on the issues and promotion of the importance of Scenic Rivers. He also said as a legislator that he and his colleagues need to become more knowledgeable and involved in supporting the OSRC and preservation of Scenic Rivers.

Chairman Hilsher asked Senator Shaw if he thought the legislature would be receptive if OSRC identified new funding strategies and other needed tools. Senator Shaw responded he would, yet was quick to point out he has no idea what the Legislature as a whole would do.

**\*Chairman Hilsher then moved to agenda item number 15.**

**15. Consideration, vote to approve, amend or take other action authorizing the Administrator to undertake OSRC Rulemaking Notice and Public Hearings specifically related to Oklahoma Administrative Code 630-Scenic Rivers Commission adhering to provisions of Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act, OSRC Rules and Oklahoma Scenic Rivers Act (Title 82 Oklahoma Statutes § 1451-1471) that may result in the promulgation of amended and new rules for addressing, but not limited to, the below listed topics:**

- **New rule banning possession and consumption of alcohol in excess of 3.2% by weight on all scenic rivers within OSRC jurisdiction;**
- **New rule restricting possession and consumption of 3.2% beer and other likened beverages to certain sections and certain days on scenic rivers within the OSRC jurisdiction;**
- **New rule banning possession and use of beer bongs/funnels or other devices used to accelerate or influence the ingesting of alcoholic beverages within OSRC jurisdiction;**
- **Amend rules related to non-commercial/private-owned flotation device users floating without permit to pay annual fee of \$10 instead of \$1 when caught;**
- **New rule for day use "permits" on public access areas that include alcohol restrictions, refuse disposal/take away requirement, etc.;**
- **Amend rules limiting number of Commercial Flotation Device (CFD) Licenses from 3,900 to lesser number, and including limitations on numbers of raft licenses in congested areas of the Illinois River;**
- **New rule requiring commercial float operators using public access areas to launch or retrieve flotation devices to remove trash and maintain premises on Saturday, Sundays, and Holidays during the primary float season (May 1 – Labor Day Weekend);**
- **Amendments to correct scrivener's errors or clarify language within existing rules; and,**
- **Consideration of amended or new rule language resulting from discussions among Commissioners and/or proposed from the public during the rulemaking process.**

Chairman Hilsher spoke about these matters;

- **New rule banning possession and consumption of alcohol in excess of 3.2% by weight on all scenic rivers within OSRC jurisdiction;** He said he has had a lot of comments from the public about this.
- **New rule restricting possession and consumption of 3.2% beer and other likened beverages to certain sections and certain days on scenic rivers within the OSRC jurisdiction;** Chairman Hilsher says that instead of all alcohol being banned from the river at all times, maybe do something like have an alcohol free Holiday or Zone.
- **New rule banning possession and use of beer bongs/funnels or other devices used to accelerate or influence the ingesting of alcoholic beverages within OSRC jurisdiction;** Chairman Hilsher spoke about the 50 quart ice chest rule.

- **Amend rules related to non-commercial/private-owned flotation device users floating without permit to pay annual fee of \$10 instead of \$1 when caught;** Chairman Hilsher stated that he thought that if people get caught without a permit they should have to pay the \$10 annual private use permit.
  - **New rule for day use “permits” on public access areas that include alcohol restrictions, refuse disposal/take away requirement, etc.;** Chairman Hilsher said that the CFO should assist OSRC in the cleanup of those public access areas that they use.
  - **Amend rules limiting number of Commercial Flotation Device (CFD) Licenses from 3,900 to lesser number, and including limitations on numbers of raft licenses in congested areas of the Illinois River;** The Chairman was quick to point out he is certain it will be a contentious issue if it is addressed.
  - **New rule requiring commercial float operators using public access areas to launch or retrieve flotation devices to remove trash and maintain premises on Saturday, Sundays, and Holidays during the primary float season (May 1 – Labor Day Weekend);** Chairman Hilsher said that there is already help with this.
  - **Amendments to correct scrivener’s errors or clarify language within existing rules; and,**
  - **Consideration of amended or new rule language resulting from discussions among Commissioners and/or proposed from the public during the rulemaking process.**
- Chairman Hilsher concluded the discussion by explaining what will happen when OSRC undertakes the rulemaking process.

Chairman Hilsher then motioned to immediately advance rulemaking on the items listed. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Randall. Before calling the roll on the motion, Administrator Fite interjected that the Oklahoma Secretary of the State’s Office of Administrative Rules oversees all rulemaking and there have been some recent administrative/legislative changes that are time sensitive impacting rulemaking. He cautioned Commissioners it may take more than 45 days advanced notice before OSRC may formally begin consideration of any rulemaking. Upon that news Chairman Hilsher then withdrew his motion.

Administrator Fite then recommended if Commissioners were contemplating moving forward with rulemaking this fall that they consider amending OSRC Rule Chapter 10 Licensing and Use Permits to require that all flotation devices must have on board for all persons a U.S. Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device that is appropriately-sized and in good working order. Additionally, he said the amendment should include a requirement that all children 12 years of age and younger must wear their personal flotation device at all times while floating on a scenic river. At the conclusion of Mr. Fite’s recommendation, Chairman Hilsher offered a new motion, which includes the life jacket amendment that the OSRC vote to approve advancing rulemaking subject to all provisions of Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act and other applicable laws/rules and set the schedule as soon as possible. Commissioner Randall seconded the new motion. Before calling the question, Chairman recapped to Commissioners what he envisioned as the process is for proposed rulemaking.

**10. Presentation by Commissioner Rick Stubblefield related to Illinois River Watershed Partnership Activities and Work Program.**

Commissioner Stubblefield openly thanked State Senator Wayne Shaw for his cooperation and participation in OSRC issues. He then recognized and introduced Delia Haak. He yielded his time to Dr. Haak who talked about the partnership since its inception in 2005, and this being the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary. She talked about how diverse the projects are that they support. She explained the organizations funding/grants that allow them to do their work/projects. She briefly talked about the Clean Water Act and other specific water quality improvement projects. At the conclusion of her remarks, Commissioner Stubblefield wrapped up saying his agenda item was intended as action item but rather just informational.

**11. Consideration, vote to ratify, amend or take other action related to Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality and Oklahoma Scenic Rivers Commission FY-2016 Land Protection Division \$50K Grant Contract for employing seasonal employees dedicated to litter control and clean-up activities and "trash cop" law enforcement along with promoting litter-reduction, proper trash disposal and facilitate recycling on scenic rivers. Presented by Administrator.**

Administrator Fite recommended Commissioners approve ratification of the contract as presented. Commissioner Stubblefield motioned to approve. Commissioner Larson seconded the motion.

Contract will provide \$19,938 to partially fund USGS-OSRC FY-2016 Illinois River Water Quality Monitoring and Stream Gaging Network Program and \$8,200 for placement and servicing of portable toilets in the Illinois River Watershed. Presented by Administrator.**

Administrator Fite recommended Commissioners approve the contract as presented. Commissioner Pickle motioned to approve. Commissioner Larson seconded the motion.

14. Consideration, vote to approve, amend or take other action on Riparian Protection Conservation Easement with Don Lucas and Family. Specifically, the contract is for a two-acre parcel of land located NW¼ SW¼ SW¼ Section 18, Township 18 North, Range 23 East, Cherokee County, term of agreement is 30 years and contract cost is \$4,500. Presented by Administrator.

Administrator Fite explained the proposed Riparian Protection Conservation Easement and why he chose Don Lucas and his Family. He first explained the funding will be derived from \$4,500 refund coming from another Easement that was found to have overpaid a cooperator for two acres @\$2,250 per acre. Those funds now must be re-expended for a likened Easement Project. Mr. Fite said that he targeted the new site to abate an aesthetic view intrusion along the Illinois River upstream of Combs Bridge where a number of old vehicles would be removed from an area next to the river that the public could see while floating and at the same remove possible contaminants from storage of said vehicles and other materials presently stored on the property. Commissioner Stubblefield motioned to approve. Commissioner Fuhr seconded the motion.

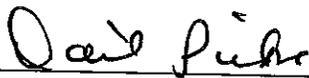

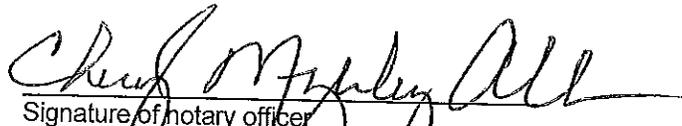
