Things to consider when providing services through Telepsychology:

Oklahoma Law requires that an individual must be licensed by the Oklahoma State Board of Examiners of Psychologists to provide psychological services in Oklahoma, or be exempt under the Psychologists Licensing Act. If you are licensed in Oklahoma, no additional certification is required to practice Telehealth/Telepsychology with clients located in Oklahoma. However, it is recommended that you considering the following:

- APA Guidelines for the Practice of Telepsychology
- ASPPB Guidelines for the Practice of Telepsychology, developed by the APA/ASPPB/APAIT Joint Task Force
- Contact the psychology licensing board in the state in which you or your client will be located during the time of service, to determine whether or not such practice is permitted in that jurisdiction.
- Check to see if your malpractice insurance covers services provided via telehealth outside of Oklahoma.
- Oklahoma is a member of the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact (PSYPACT) an interstate compact designed to facilitate the practice of telepsychology and the temporary in-person, face-to-face practice of psychology across state boundaries. If the state you plan to provide services is a PSYPACT State, consider applying for an ASPPB E-Passport or an ASPPB Interjurisdictional Practice Certificate (IPC).
- APA Ethical Principles of Psychologists and Code of Conduct 3.10(a), 4.02(c), 5.01(a), and 5.04.
- Pursuant to OAC 575:10-1-3(i), if you are a licensed psychologist providing supervision to an unlicensed supervisee, the supervisee is only allowed to practice under that supervisor's license and supervision.
